You can become a STORMWATER VOLUNTEER!

Did you know that Chatham County's stormwater system flows from the streets to the creeks without ANY type of filtration or treatment?

This separate storm and sewer system prevents sewerage from entering waterways when heavy rains come..... WHEW! However, a separate storm and sewer system means that rainwater carries all trash and chemicals off the land and into the nearby creeks and marshes... GROSS!



To keep our creeks and marshes clean, Chatham County has started a volunteer program to help residents find ways to can help KEEP STORMWATER CLEAN which keeps creeks and marshes clean too.

Coastal Georgia Adopt A Drain (AAD) is focused on educating residents on our local stormwater system highlighting ways in which we all can prevent stormwater pollution through education and service.



AAD Stormwater Volunteers are needed to:

- Apply storm drain tiles to stormwater drains in the Unincorporated Chatham County area.
- Adopt a nearby storm drain to monitor for any debris that might clog the drain, damage from large trucks, or illegal dumping of paints or oils into the drain.
